Objectives and activities

Summary of the purposes of the charity set out in its governing document

To establish & run a village hall & to promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of the area, without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, age, disability, nationality, race or political, religious or other opinions, the provision of facilities for education, recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity, or disablement, financial hardship or social & economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare & with the object of improving the conditions of life of the said inhabitants.

The trustees consider that they have complied with their duties to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Summary of the main activities in relation to those purposes for the public benefit and summary of the main achievements of the charity

We cannot start this report without giving thanks to the previous Chair, Gill Birks, who retired from her position of Chair and Trustee at our last AGM. Gill led the organisation through a period of growth and development, which is evident in the strong position organisationally that we are in today. Whilst Gill retired, we were delighted to welcome five new Trustees onto the board in September last year. All of whom bring a wealth of experience, skills and knowledge to the team.

Over the last twelve months, we have continued our organisational growth and development, taking advantage of new partnerships and opportunities. We were successful in our bid for Glusburn Institute to become the Community Anchor Organisation for South Craven, partnering with North Yorkshire Council. This gave us the opportunity to create a new job role in the organisation and we welcomed Jo Clark to the team on 21st August as our Venue Operations Assistant. Jo's role focuses on developing and sustaining volunteer opportunities and assisting the day to day running of our increasingly busy centre. Our volunteer team has grown from 20 to 60 under her stewardship.

This has given Debby Richardson, our Centre Manager, the opportunity to focus on nurturing further relationships and partnerships and developing the Community Anchor model. Supported by Community First Yorkshire, we were awarded further funding to become a health-focused Community Anchor Organisation for the Bradford VCS Alliance. This has led to a wider partnership from the initial South Craven Anchor with Skipton Step Into Action, The Place in Settle and Bradford VCS Alliance. This brought in yet additional funding to develop ourselves as the Craven Wellbeing Network. We will thus be the Hub providing a route to grassroots, community-based health and wellbeing services.

Our relationship with Pioneer Projects continues, providing a weekly creative activity to support mental wellbeing. The session is well attended and highly valued by regular participants. Our continuing growth of partnership working, demonstrates how we have become a trusted organisation to work with in the community we serve.

We continue to see an upward trend in visitor and participant numbers. Our dedicated and valued team of volunteers continues to be at the heart of our programme. We simply could not provide our events and activities without them – they really are absolute stars!

We **welcomed** new members of staff to the caretaking team over this year and as always they continue to work diligently and step up to the plate, in what is often a busy 7 day week operation. To this end, our centre programme has again continued to grow this year, to match the demand of our community. Our wide range of wellbeing, health based, cultural and creative activities and events has attracted a wide audience, with many performances selling out completely and activities being very well attended.

Our financial position has remained steady, with capital works and maintenance programmes continuing to tie up considerable amounts of money on an ever-ageing building. We are extremely grateful to Glusburn and Cross Hills Parish Council and Airedale Group based in Cross Hills, who provided us with financial support to redecorate the Chapel and renovate a number of the stained glass windows. Whilst we have seen a number of successful cosmetic and accessibility improvements over the last few years, the fact still remains that we are working with a building that is over 130 years old and is falling into a poor state of repair. Over the winter it is has become very apparent that something needs to be done to safeguard the historic significance of the building and ensure it is fit for future use. We must ensure that the facility is structurally sound and in good condition externally as well as internally, and that we look to be sustainable in our approach to the impact our operation has on the environment. I can only see that a large scale capital project will secure our unique building for future use.

Financial review

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period

There was a deficit of £6,154 for the year with unrestricted reserves at £59,298 at 31 March 2024.

Statement explaining the policy for holding reserves stating why they are held

The trustees have adopted as their reserves policy that they should seek to maintain the sum of £20,000 as a reserve against short term financial difficulties. The specific aims of the reserve are -; £8,000 to pay two months salaries; £4,000 to pay on-going costs, utilities, rates etc., £5,000 to pay the annual insurance bill and £3,000 in case of emergency repairs and contingencies

Amount of reserves held

At 31st March 2024 unrestricted reserves amounted to £59,298, however £31,268 of this is represented by depreciable assets.

1 Basis of preparation

1.1 Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (Charities SORP (FRS 102)).

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

Expenditure

Raising funds

Cost of raising funds comprise those costs associated with attracting voluntary income.

Charitable activities

Charitable activities expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

Assets

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity
